Walk into any British government office or building in any part of the world and you are highly likely to see something from the Government Art Collection. With the works dispersed in about 450 buildings at home and overseas, we now have our art placed in nearly every capital city in the world. This gives us a unique opportunity to showcase the excellence and diversity of British art and culture in a collection ranging from the sixteenth century through to the twenty-first.

This year, in addition to visiting places such as Montevideo to carry out inspections of our works, the GAC also made a first-ever trip to the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa. Closer to home, we are delighted to have been involved with the refurbishment of the DCMS offices at Cockspur Street, commissioning three contemporary artists to make work for the glass partitions throughout the building.

A summary of this year would not be complete without mention of the forthcoming publication of our very own volume in the Public Foundation catalogue series. This is a huge ongoing project to catalogue every painting in public ownership in this country. The GAC volume will show all the oil paintings in our Collection, just over two and a half thousand; and be a marvellous illustration of the extraordinary variety of the works acquired by the government over the years. We're delighted to be taking part in the PCF project, which will be another important step towards improving public access to the nation's heritage.

As Chairman of the Advisory Committee, I would like to thank all the Committee Members for the passion and commitment they continue to show in their support for the GAC. Our meetings can be protracted but this is largely because the approval of acquisitions is no simple task, requiring carefully balanced judgements on all sides. And our discussions are always lively affairs.

Finally, I would also like to offer my own, as well as the Committee's, heart-felt tribute to Penny Johnson and her multi-talented team for all the hard work they do. The government is extraordinarily well-served by them.

Director's Report

The Government Art Collection's role is to promote British art, history and culture by presenting works from the Collection in Government buildings across the world. As in previous years, 2006-07 saw the acquisition of a significant number of new works. One of the new acquisitions, The Space Within or the Forest of Douanier Rousseau (1987-88) by Victor Pasmore, was hung in the Deputy Minister's Residence in Paris. A dense arrangement of green circular shapes on a wooden board, the abstract composition refers to the naïve forests in the work of the self-taught French painter Henri Rousseau. In New York, Love Me Do by Peter Blake was selected for the Residence of the Deputy Ambassador to the United Nations to pay homage to American culture, and in particular Pop Art. Blake's work was added to a display of Pop Art already in this location including a work by British Pop Artist Joe Tilson and Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom from the series Reigning Queens by Andy Warhol, the leading exponent of American Pop Art.

We continue to buy works of art that reflect contemporary Britain and the diverse range of artists living and working here. Projection is a white-on-white mixed media map of the world by Mona Hatoum, the Palestinian-born London based artist. A sense of place, or more particularly identity, home and belonging, is central to her work. Another striking addition is Bach ...Six Suites for the Solo Cello by Idris Khan, a dense, multi-layered photographic recreation of a musical score. The work now hangs in the reception area of the Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) offices in Cockspur Street, where it can be seen by the many users of the building. A further acquisition, Grayson Perry's Print for a Politician, a map detailing an imaginary land populated by various tribes of people divided by their ideologies, was fittingly installed in the Minster for Culture's office in DCMS.

We continue to acquire historical work and were delighted to buy at auction a version of the well-known nineteenth-century painting The Crossing Sweeper, painted in 1893 by William Powell Frith. This oil painting of Victorian London, with its depiction of a young boy imploring a well-dressed woman for recompense having swept the muddy street before her, adds a further dimension to the prints and drawings by Frith already in the Collection. Amongst other notable twentieth-century purchases was Spring Song, an abstract composition by the Scottish artist William Gear, painted in1951 around the time that he exhibited with the European artists COBRA group.

This year we have acquired some outstanding examples of contemporary photography. Jane and Louise Wilson are best known for their large-scale film and video installations that reflect disused industrial spaces. Safe Light, Reflected Ballroom is from a series of photographs shot at a factory in the north east of England in 2003 in which the ambiguous space, cast in a bright yellow light, adds to an atmosphere of unease. Another photographic purchase, Random Growth without Loss of Stability by Nick Waplington, uses humour to comment on the idiosyncrasies of the modern, capitalist age; while Gayle Chong Kwan's photographic series Cockaigne makes landscapes out of food, addressing the profligacy of the western world.

It has been an especially busy year for displays in overseas locations. At the Ambassador's Residence in Vienna, we installed new displays of work by Michael Craig-Martin and Paul Morrison. While in the Vatican, in Rome, we oversaw the transfer of works of art from the residence of the UK Ambassador to the Holy See, to a new Residence at the Palazzo Pallavicini. This move enabled us to give prominence to a portrait of Cardinal Sforza Pallavicini (1607-1667), whose descendants own the building. New displays were installed in the Residence in Beijing, including a portrait of George Macartney, (1737-1806)1st British Ambassador to China by Ozias Humphrey. Taking advantage of a major refurbishment of the Toyko Residence to protect it from future seismic activity, we returned works to the UK for conservation while other works, including Red Sand Throws in the Gotemba Quarry, a photographic triptych by Andy Goldsworthy, were selected as part of a new display. These photographs document a work of art which the artist calls 'sand throws', made by throwing red earth into Lake Tanuki, at the foot of Mount Fuji. New work was also selected for Bratislava, Kabul, Brussels, Moscow, Paris and Seoul.

In addition to visiting Madrid, Bogotá and Montevideo to carry out inspections of our works, we also made our first-ever trips to Addis Ababa, Rabat, Nicosia and Kingston where we carried out some much-needed conservation and documentation work. Addis Ababa was a particularly notable visit as we were able to check on the condition of a number of works and hang a new work; a large painting with 23 separate vignettes by the Ethiopian artist Johannes Tessema, recording Queen Elizabeth II's official state visit to Ethiopia in February 1965, as a guest of the Emperor Haile Selassie. The Queen's visit was her first to East Africa following the death of her father, King George VI, and was the occasion during which she returned several important Ethiopian treasures to the country on behalf of Britain. The painting was donated to the GAC by Sir Derek Day, a former Ambassador to Ethiopia.

As part of our regular programme, the Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool lent nine works (not required for display) to 10 Downing Street. The paintings were installed in September 2006 in the ground floor corridor leading to the Cabinet room, where they remained for twelve months. These included work by David Bomberg, Charles Conder, Harold Gilman and the wonderful detailed, textured painting Villas at Cookham by Stanley Spencer. A Fishmonger's Shop by Jacques Laurent Agasse, a painting we had purchased at auction in the previous year, went on display in the White Room, one of the formal reception rooms in Downing Street.

We have been working with the Privy Council to display their collection of historical silver objects that had been in storage. A selection of these pieces, dating from the 17th to 19th centuries, is now on display outside the Waiting Room on the ground floor of 10 Downing Street. Several of the pieces were issued in 1686 in the reign of James II and others date from 1702 and 1703 during Queen Anne's reign. Items were issued to each member of the Privy Council and include an inkstand, a pair of candlesticks, a pair of candle snuffers and a snuffer tray.

Following the Government reshuffle in May 2006, we made changes to displays in the Ministerial offices of the Department of Transport (Douglas Alexander), Trade & Industry (Margaret Hodge), Education & Skills (Beverley Hughes) and the Treasury (Stephen Timms). Also in the UK, a large full-length portrait of a former Foreign Secretary and President of the League of Nations, Edward Grey, Ist Viscount Grey of Falloden (1862-1933) by George Fiddes Watt, was installed in Lancaster House. In Regional Government Offices we began the process of looking for appropriate works in the Collection for the new Government Office for Yorkshire and Humberside.

Underpinning our displays are the technical and conservation programmes. This year 152 oil paintings, 133 works on paper, 41 objects and 23 historic frames were conserved. These included the paintings Whitehall from St James's Park by Hendrik Danckerts and I Wonder What My Heroes Think of the Space Race by Derek Boshier. Panorama of London From the Roof of Albion Mills, after Robert Barker, a 19th century aquatint in a horizontal format, also underwent conservation. A series of paintings in gouache of Dante's Inferno by Syed Sallem Arif Quadri was also conserved and reframed in close consultation with the artist. The series was reframed within a single frame, greatly improving the appearance of the work. Our framing programme included the production of 270 new frames and 16 historical reproduction frames made using traditional techniques. This included the conservation of the frame for Daniel Maclise's historical work The Chivalric Vow of the Ladies of the Peacock and Three Naval Officers by Godfrey Kneller, which has a highly elaborate gilded 'Kent' frame, decorated with painted sea shells.

We were particularly pleased to be able to commission artists to work on the refurbishment of our own department's headquarters at Cockspur Street. Previously, we had mainly been involved in commissioning projects for new buildings on behalf of other Government departments, in particular the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. Working within the DCMS building presented the exciting challenge of commissioning new work from three artists for a series of glass partitioned spaces, located over five floors. Simon Faithfull used drawings enlarged from a Palm[™] personal digital assistant to create urban cityscapes meandering across the glass partitions, while Catherine Bertola's delicate designs enlarge details from traditional lace making. Henna Nadeem based her work on Islamic patterns: she created designs on the top floor that allude to heaven, whereas on a lower floor her patterns and colour refer to earth and the natural world.

Other commissioning projects in the UK included the supervision of the final stages of work at the Home Office in Marsham Street, principally the project by Emma Kay. Unfortunately, the sculpture by Eva Rothschild intended for the atrium was cancelled by the Home Office in December. Over the year we have been developing proposals by a number of artists for the refurbished Ministry of Justice (formerly the Department for Constitutional Affairs) in the Basil Spence designed building in Queen Anne's Gate. This is due to be completed in spring 2008.

On behalf of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, for their new purpose-built Embassy at Sana'a in Yemen, we commissioned **One Thousand Four Hundred and Forty to Zero**, an installation featuring suspended plumb lines by Jenny West. The work was installed early in 2007 by the artist, who is featured talking about the work on a video and which is to be made into a podcast downloadable from the GAC website. We also began a commissioning project for the new Embassy in Doha, Qatar.

We remain committed to a programme of increasing access to the GAC. Research continued into both the historical and contemporary works in the Collection in preparation for providing interpretative information about the works of art. We have added more extended texts about works of art to the GAC website and have updated the Projects section to feature the Home Office commissions and a range of smaller projects from over the last two years, including those in Paris, Brussels, Chennai, New Delhi and Brasilia. We will be developing the website further over the next year, in particular to bring it into line with recent accessibility guidelines.

During this period we provided a number of locations both in the UK and overseas with information packs, for example the offices of Jack Straw (Leader of the House of Commons) and

Jacqui Smith (Chief Whip) and the Residences of Ambassadors in Ankara, Beijing, Bratislava and Seoul. We also researched a number of contemporary acquisitions including works by Gilbert and George, Joe Tilson, Cerith Wyn Evans, Marc Quinn and Runa Islam. Research into Henry Raeburn's portrait of James Hamilton was continued by Alison Fuller, the Assistant Curator: Research and Interpretation, who we were sorry to lose in January when she took up the Post of Assistant to the Curator of Pictures and Sculpture at the National Trust.

Another way that the GAC currently increases the accessibility of its Collection is by lending its works to other organisations. Following a request from the Newstead Abbey Byron Society, the GAC made a special loan of the portrait of Ada Lovelace by Margaret Carpenter. The painting was lent to an exhibition held as part of the International Byron Festival, at St Mary Magdalene Church in Hucknall, near Nottingham, the burial place of Ada and her father Lord Byron. Other loans to UK venues made during the year included In the Studio of Jamini Roy, a painting by Howard Hodgkin which was sent to Tate Britain for their touring Hodgkin retrospective and George, Earl of Orkney, 4th Duke of Hamilton (1666-1737) by Martin Maingaud, sent to Taplow Court. We sent two watercolours to locations abroad: The Allied Fleets Anchored in the Bosphorus of 1853 and Encampment at Scutari on the Bosphorus of 1854 by Amadeo Preziosi, both lent to the Yapi Kredi Kazim Taskent Gallery in Istanbul.

We also provide public access to our Collection through a programme of tours of our central London headquarters. These fortnightly tours have attracted visits from a range of organisations including the Contemporary Art Society, the London Society, the Art Fund, Penguin Books Art Club and the Friends of Kettle's Yard and the Royal Academy. We participated for the first time in the Museums and Galleries Open Day in May, running further behind-the-scenes tours of the GAC, including a British Sign Language interpretative tour. In September, we were again involved in the London Open House Weekend, arranging hourly tours of the premises, including two tours that offered BSL interpretation. The feedback from these tours has been very positive with visitors enjoying the opportunity to see the works of art currently at our headquarters. About 25% of the Collection is usually there at any one time, while the rest is out on display in some 450 locations in the UK around the world.

We were asked by the Public Catalogue Foundation to take part in a project to provide a complete record of all the oil paintings in the UK in public ownership. This ambitious project to increase public access to the nation's heritage involves cataloguing the works in a series of affordable volumes, one of which is devoted to the approximately 2,500 oil paintings in the Government Art Collection.



Having identified the need for 400 of these paintings to be photographed, we undertook a programme of on-site photography in locations where work was not due to return to the GAC in the foreseeable future. The catalogue is due to be launched in January 2008.

We are extraordinarily well supported by a distinguished Advisory Committee. As Director I am able to draw upon the combined wisdom of some of the leading figures in the art world. I'd like to thank them warmly for their wise counsel. I am also most fortunate to have a marvellous team — a group of people who never fail to go the extra distance in the interests of the Collection.
