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Director's Report

Introduction

This two-year Annual Report comes after an extraordinary time for the Government Art Collection and the world. A planned short-term hiatus between the move from the Collection's home of twenty years in Tottenham Court Road in April 2019, to new premises in Whitehall became an extended, year-long challenge, with the Collection in storage and staff, unusually, separated from the artworks that we all care for and display. This period of isolation was amplified as the UK entered its first lockdown of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020.

A major public engagement project with Waltham Forest Borough of Culture took place over the spring and summer of 2019 opening up opportunities and ambition for partnerships to extend our audiences. 2020 became a time to develop our digital reach with the addition of a new Digital Engagement role which started just as the world went virtual in the face of social distancing. Throughout this, the Collection adapted to deliver the Robson Orr TenTen Award commissions from a celebratory event in 2019 to a live streamed online press launch in 2020.

Acquisitions continued to develop the Collection with works by artists that embrace the diversity of the whole United Kingdom. The physical limitations of 2020 and the closure of many galleries and art fairs, combined with the challenges that this posed to artists, encouraged the Collection to create an ambitious collecting policy for the year of lockdowns; in March 2021, this culminated in our Art X-UK project that saw

us working with visual arts networks across the UK, capturing an incredible snapshot of artistic talent. In many ways, the challenges of these two years have created opportunities for innovation and change.

Move to the Old Admiralty Building

From Easter 2019, staff started working from an office in the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport at 100 Parliament Street, with the artworks stored temporarily at the art handling company Momart, in East London. The Collection managed to deliver displays in the UK and internationally over this period, as well as loans to exhibitions, despite the challenging circumstances. The move to Old Admiralty Building was officially completed just before Christmas 2020, with all works confirmed as having safely arrived following an audit in December. The team have been extremely dedicated during the move phase of the project, working long hours to move 6,000 works into the new building during changing rules on social distancing and escalations of COVID cases. 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The Robson Orr TenTen Award

This annual print commission is awarded to an outstanding British artist with the support of philanthropists Sybil Robson Orr and Matthew Orr who were inspired by an American initiative by the Foundation for Arts and Preservation in Embassies. Introduced to the Government Art Collection by Outset Contemporary Art Fund, the Robson Orrs' enthusiasm for supporting a UK art commission with global reach, became the TenTen project. This ten-year commitment will create important new additions to the Collection around the world, while annual sales from eleven of the prints sold through Outset raise funds for the Collection to acquire art by emerging talent in the UK.

TenTen 2019

Leading British artist Tacita Dean was awarded the Robson Orr TenTen Award 2019. A selfdeclared 'collector of clouds', Tacita Dean's *Foreign Policy (screenprint edition)* for the 2019 TenTen print commission reflects an ongoing series of works and a very specific moment in time. The screenprint is an interpretation of a similarly titled large-scale work from 2016, drawn in chalk on blackboard, which was on loan by the artist to Sir Simon McDonald, Permanent Under-Secretary for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs and Head of HM Diplomatic Service at the press launch of the print. The new work was made into a screenprint using 14 layers of ink by Kip Gresham of The Print Studio, Cambridge.

TenTen 2020

Yinka Shonibare CBE was awarded the Robson Orr TenTen Award 2020. The new work was unveiled at the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office on Tuesday 6 October 2020, with a predominantly online audience. Online, Caroline Dinenage MP, Minister of State for Digital and Culture announced the artist, followed by a speech by Matthew Orr, and a conversation between the artist and Penny Johnson CBE, Director of the Government Art Collection.

Hibiscus and the Rose is an expression of cultural exchange between Britain and the rest of the world. The hibiscus is a genus of numerous species of herbs, shrubs, and trees in the mallow family (Malvaceae), widely found in many of the warmer temperate Commonwealth countries. The rose is the national flower of England and has a long tradition within English symbolism.



Acquisitions - 2019/2020

Our acquisitions this year included some major works by significant living UK artists, including acclaimed black artists Denzil Forrester, Lynette Yiadom-Boakye and Ingrid Pollard. A maquette-sized edition of Gillian Wearing's public monument to Millicent Fawcett and the suffragists, Courage Calls to Courage Everywhere, was an important addition to the Collection, following a year dedicated to collecting works by women to mark the Representation of the People's Act centenary in 2018. Other works by women included two of Maud Sulter's Les Bijoux series and Caroline Walker's painting Shaping, Siobhán Hapaska's sculpture snake, apple, tree and Barbara Walker's Vanishing Point 11 (Rubens), graphite on embossed paper. We were also pleased to acquire Oval Motif, Maroon, Ochre and Lilac from 1958, a work by Wendy Pasmore (1915-2015) who we felt important to include when considering artwork by women working in the early 20th century. Like many who worked with or had a relationship with a male artist, and were often seen as equals at the time, Pasmore is little remembered in art history other than as a 'wife of'.

We were particularly excited to have bought works from young painters who are creating exciting figurative works, including Joy Labinjo (born 1994), Louise Giovanelli (born 1993) and Flora Yukhnovich (born 1990). We were also pleased to continue our support of artists who have graduated within five years, through the Bloomberg New Contemporaries selected New acquisition: *Parabiosis – solid generated by rotation,* digital print by Ingrid Pollard © Ingrid Pollard



annual exhibitions, as well as acquiring from a visit to Manchester studios Paradise Works and Manchester Contemporary.

In May 2019 the opportunity arose through auction to support the acquisition of portraits of Madame Tibor de Scitovszky, nee Hanna Hodosi and Tibor de Scitovszky (both 1927) by Philip Alexius de László (born 1869). The works were acquired in New York and were returned to Budapest in September. The Scitovszkys built the house that became the current Ambassador's Residence, and where the portraits previously hung in the late 1920s to mid-30s. They were reinstated to their historic positions to coincide with a major de László exhibition at the Hungarian National Gallery celebrating the 150th anniversary of the artist's birth. They were unveiled by the Ambassador and Director of the Collection at an event organised by The De László Archive Trust on the eve of the exhibition opening.

Acquisitions - 2020/2021

In response to the global pandemic and UK lockdowns, the Government Art Collection collaborated with contemporary art networks to collect new works by 45 visual artists from across the UK, celebrating and supporting the diversity of creativity across the Union. Art X-UK, supported by the Advisory Committee on the Government Art Collection, was a unique way of responding to the impact of COVID-19 on the visual arts sector.

The Collection invited the networks for nine regions in England, and networks in Wales, Northern Ireland and Scotland, to nominate artists. Our collection curators went on a virtual tour of artists' studios from Penwith to Ballygally, to select works for the Collection to display in government buildings worldwide.

This project has enabled the Collection to support 45 artists, acquiring over 90 works, and spending £230,000 across the UK. As

part of the nomination process, we asked each network to form a group and put forward artists' names, providing a statement on their selection process for transparency, including a list of the selectors. There was a diverse representation of artists across different backgrounds.

Other works acquired this year included a series of prints from the Glasgow Women's Library, and two large significant works; *The Audition in Colour* (1997-2020) by Sonia Boyce (born 1962), a multi-photographic-and-text work, based on an early project working with the public in Manchester; and *Diana of Versailles* (2019-2020) by Yinka Shonibare CBE (born 1962), a sculpture of the Roman goddess of hunting. The classical style of antique statuary is transformed by Shonibare's uniquely designed, signature Dutch wax batik fabric patterns, painted directly onto its surface. The figure's head is replaced by a hand-painted watercolour globe of a contemporary map, a motif alluding to a universal human identity.

Commissions and gifts


HMA Residence, Bangkok

The new Ambassador's Residence in Bangkok, Thailand, opened at the end of 2019 on the 68th floor of the newly built Four Seasons Private Residence, with panoramic views of Bangkok and the Chao Phraya River. The Committee approved the commissioning of a new artwork by Sara Barker. Sara's work considers the Residence's view of the city dominated by the river, using Olivia Laing's book *To the River* (2011) as a starting point for the work. Barker's commission was scheduled to be installed in May 2020; however, the project has been delayed by COVID-19.

Edmund de Waal generously gifted his work *metamorphosen, 1* to the Government Art Collection. The work was on long loan since 2017 and placed in the British Embassy, Vienna. Arranged on six shelves in a glass vitrine are dark-glazed porcelain vessels and shards, pieces of dark lead, Cor-Ten steel, graphite, oxidised silver and black marble. Two time periods influenced de Waal's *black works*, of which this is one. In 1938, the Ephrussis, an established Viennese Jewish family persecuted by the Nazis, were forced to flee the city, abandoning their ancestral home. A descendant of the family, de Waal spent years in Vienna

researching his family history, culminating in his acclaimed memoir, *The Hare with Amber Eyes* (2010). In 2016, Vienna's Kunsthistorisches Museum invited de Waal to curate an exhibition, *During the Night*, based on its collection. For *During the Night*, he created a large vitrine of black materials, echoing the show's themes of anxiety and fear of the unknown.

The title of de Waal's sculpture references *Metamorphosen*, a score for 23 strings composed by Richard Strauss at the close of the Second World War. Strauss was inspired by Goethe's work, *On the Metamorphosis of Plants* (1790), celebrating rebirth and transformation.

Displays

Throughout these two years, our selection and installation of new displays of art in buildings in the UK and abroad continued to contribute to the UK's wider efforts in promoting soft power and cultural diplomacy. Planning how and where artworks are placed in ministerial offices, conference rooms and reception areas allows us to create opportunities for visitors and staff to encounter artworks first-hand. The pandemic inevitably caused disruption to the delivery of many displays, particularly international displays that were in train. Selected UK displays

10 Downing Street

The annual display of work from a gallery outside London continued with a selection from the Whitworth Art Gallery, Manchester. These works were installed in the area leading to the Cabinet and the Reception rooms in October 2019, and replaced a display from Walsall Art Gallery. Amongst the works from the Whitworth are an unusual commission of Ancoats hospital, as well as a landscape, by L.S. Lowry, and an early painting by Bridget Riley. This selection staved in place over 2020 due to repeated lockdowns. Recently acquired paintings by Lynette Yiadom-Boakye, Flora Yukhnovich and Rose Wylie were installed in the Anteroom on the first floor, the only room in the building dedicated to contemporary art.

Foreign and Commonwealth Office

A contemporary display titled *Art Now: Dispatches from the Government Art Collection* was installed at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) in September 2019. This display featured Tina Keane's neon Faded Wallpaper, Devotional by Sonia Boyce, Nelson's Ship in a Bottle by Yinka Shonibare and Langlands & Bell's print series A MUSE UM.

D-Day anniversary, 6 June

Winston Churchill's paintings *Mimizan Lake* and *Seascape*, along with a photograph of him in the wartime Cabinet Room by Walter Stoneman, were displayed overnight in Portsmouth to mark the 75th anniversary of D-Day. Heads of State in attendance included Angela Merkel, Emmanuel Macron and Donald Trump.

2020/2021

From the start of COVID-19 lockdown, Collection staff were unable to access works in storage; this severely restricted the number of new displays realised. UK projects were further restricted while the move to the Old Admiralty Building was completed at the end of 2020. Early 2021 saw displays completed for the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rishi Sunak; Cabinet Secretary, Simon Case; and the new Permanent Secretary at the Ministry of Justice, Antonia Romeo.

Selected international projects

2019/2020

Collection staff visited The Convent, the official residence of the Governor of **Gibraltar**, in June 2019 to carry out an audit and comprehensive photography, cataloguing and condition checking of the 161 works displayed there. The visit allowed them to appraise the paintings and works on paper, enriching our records and identifying conservation issues that may have arisen since the last visit to the property, 17 years ago.

The newly selected display of contemporary work for **Paris** was completed in April 2019 and a new bilingual leaflet produced. Works on display include Haroon Mirza, Zarina Bhimji, Celia Hempton and Thomas J Price. Alongside this, two works were returned to the Wellington Room following conservation. A new display was installed in the Ambassador's Residence in **Tokyo** in September 2019, ahead of the Rugby World Cup and in anticipation of the 2020 Olympics. The installation includes prints commissioned for London 2012 and a large work by Jane and Louise Wilson who undertook one of the British Council Residencies for UK in Japan. A new selection for the Consul General's Residence in **Los Angeles**, to supplement existing work, was installed in time for the Frieze Art Fair Los Angeles in February 2020 when the Consul General hosted a reception to promote the Robson Orr TenTen Award.

2020/2021

From the UK's first official lockdown in March 2020 COVID-19 inevitably affected the Government Art Collection's international display programme. The first display halted was Tunis in March; this included a film intended to document Phillip King's return to place his first sculpture in the country of his birth. All other projects were suspended soon after. Timing for reinstatement of individual projects will depend upon the COVID-19 environment in the destination country, flight availability, need for Collection staff presence on site and any quarantine arrangements on return. Deferred projects include: Abuja and Lagos, Ankara, Bangkok, Cairo, Mexico, New Delhi and Tunis.

Two international projects were successfully undertaken. In **Washington**, Collection staff virtually directed the installation of works. In **Singapore**, new artworks were installed at the High Commissioner's residence, Eden Hall, named after a 14th century glass vessel in the collection of the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. Many of the works reference glass, including a Howard Hodgkin piece and a recent acquisition, the painting *being satisfied* by Robin Megganity. Conservation

2019/2020

Over 500 condition reports were undertaken, including complete condition surveys of works on display in Gibraltar and New Delhi. Six paintings were treated at the British Embassy in Tokyo, including two paintings by Carol Robertson, *Zero 1* and *Zero 2*, and a portrait of Anthony Scrope by Thomas Hudson (1701-1779). Barbara Hepworth's sculpture, *Hollow Form with Inner Form*, sited in the Rose Garden at 10 Downing Street, was restored for the state visit of Donald Trump.

In April 2019 the Head of Collection Care went to New Delhi with a colleague from the Courtauld Institute and conservator Jim Dimond to view Sir David Wilkie's coronation portrait of Queen Victoria. Cleaning tests confirmed that a conservation project could be successfully undertaken in New Delhi by Courtauld students and local conservators.

Sculptures by Matthew Darbyshire (Untitled: Shelves No. 6) and a terracotta by Nigerian artist Agboola Folarin were treated in preparation for display in Liz Truss' HMT Office and Lagos respectively, as were Fairfield by Noel Forster and Accumulation by Michael Ginsborg. Other sculptures conserved included Garden Ornament by Henri Gaudier-Brzeska and True Love by Michael Petry in preparation for the Singapore and Bangkok displays; two textiles by Barbara Dawson (The Bathing Girl and The Bathing Costume) for display in the DCMS Permanent Secretary's area; and recent acquisitions by Philip Alexius de László, and Wendy Pasmore's Oval Motif, Maroon, Ochre and Lilac, Enormous Changes at the last minute by Laura Gannon and The Late Great Planet Earth by Hilary Jack underwent treatment in preparation for display.

Among over 60 objects framed were Ben Enwonwu's Dancing Girls, The sweet sharp

taste of limes by Lubaina Himid, Good Morning Freedom by Sonia Boyce, Vanishing Point 11 (Rubens) by Barbara Walker, Man drinking coffee by Joy Labinjo and True Love by Abe Odedina. Paintings included Urban Detail by Prunella Clough, Ian Davenport's Poured Lines: Light Red, Green, Blue, Yellow, Orange, Yellow, Red and Still Life by Craigie Aitchison.

2020/2021

COVID-19 lockdown curtailed almost all conservation and framing activity over this period with most suppliers closing businesses and furloughing staff. All Government Art Collection suppliers were contacted and some works were removed from new contractor relationships to minimise potential solvency issues. Internationally, our audit programme was suspended on the advice of the Foreign & Commonwealth Office, and instead we circulated a message via FCO internal comms welcoming contact should pandemic issues affect the safety of works of art. Training in contingency measures to protect art was provided through a Zoom presentation to the High Commission in Nairobi.

Among the few works treated over the period were Jesse Darling's Equestrian Statue and Robert Peake's panel portrait of Henry Frederick. Prince of Wales (1594-1612) eldest son of King James VI & I; John Piper's wool tapestry Architectural Fantasy and Holly Hendry's recently acquired sculpture Take Good Care of My Baby. Works by Matthew Krishanu and Khadija Saye were among those framed. Towards the end of the year, however, framers and conservators were increasingly operational during the latest lockdown, and this prompted more recent activity in these areas, notably around the Art X-UK project. With these works arriving at the end of February, Collection staff gathered at a south London warehouse to intensively assess conservation and presentational requirements, and initiate the acquisition process for over 100, previously unseen, objects.

Loans to public exhibitions

Continuing our commitment to making the Collection more accessible, we lent works to a number of temporary public exhibitions in the UK and abroad. Highlights included the 1970s painting Kaieteurtoo by Frank Bowling, bought in 2009, included in Bowling's first major retrospective at Tate Britain and Ronald Moody's Male Standing Figure - The Priest, acquired in 1950 in the exhibition Get Up, Stand Up at Somerset House, alongside Chris Ofili's Afro Lunar Lovers. Two works by Jessica Dismorr and a Winifred Nicolson painting were shown at Pallant House in Radical women and Eileen Agar's Guardian of Memories was part of Dulwich Picture Gallery's British Surrealism. Two historic works, The Duke of Marlborough and the Earl of Cadogan at Blenheim (Hochstadt) by Pieter van Bloemen and Apotheosis of Apollo by Sir James Thornhill were shown at Tate Britain's The Baroque Age in Britain 1660–1714. Barbara Hepworth's Conoid, Sphere and Hollow III went on show at the Musee Rodin, Paris for an exhibition dedicated to the artist's sculptural works and Paul Nash's Event on the Downs. was shown in The Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, Boston.

COVID-19 lockdown suspended all public exhibitions. Prospective and agreed loans formed a fluid and emerging picture as many lenders rescheduled dates or cancelled exhibitions.

Research and interpretation

2019/2020

For every location where artworks are shown, our curatorial team research and produce interpretative materials for use by staff and visitors. Information has been provided for new displays in ministerial offices and other key government spaces. Recipients include Boris Johnson, Prime Minister; Sajid Javid, Chancellor of the Exchequer; Nicky Morgan, Secretary of State, DCMS; Michael Gove, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster; Andrea Leadsom, Secretary of State. BEIS; Liz Truss, Secretary of State, DIT; Robert Buckland, Secretary of State, MoJ; Michael Ellis, Solicitor General; and Sarah Healey, Permanent Secretary, DCMS.


Abroad, information was produced to accompany the new displays installed at the British Embassy and Residence in Tokyo, New Delhi, the Consul General in New York and the Consul General, Los Angeles. In preparation for the forthcoming events related to the Tokyo Olympics, a bilingual leaflet was in production, highlighting several works by contemporary artists, and the historical diplomatic links between the UK and Japan.

A short series of audio podcasts, entitled *Meeting of Cultures*, was written and produced by pre-1900 Curator, Laura Popoviciu, on the cultural and diplomatic relations between Britain and Iran from the 17th century to the present day. Funding for this project was supported by the Paul Mellon Centre for Studies in British Art. As part of the launch of the FCO's new website for Lancaster House, we contributed a short video and blog about the Collection works on display in the building.

Exploring display options for the portrait of Queen Victoria in Mumbai in December led us to an international conference marking the bicentenary of Queen Victoria's birth, to be held at Kensington Palace. For this, Laura Popiviciu and Andrew Parratt presented a paper *Victoria in Iran: Now & Then* focusing on George Hayter's autographed copy of Queen Victoria's state portrait, which is on display in Tehran, and features a Persian inscription.

2020/2021

COVID-19 offered an opportunity for more digital interpretation and the use of QR codes within labels, linking to the Collection website. Since July 2020, we have produced digital packs and trialled QR codes successfully in the UK at the British Ambassador's Residence in Singapore. 19

Representation Of The People Project

In 2015-16, the Government Art Collection worked with researchers from Black Artists and Modernism (BAM, an AHRC project) on an audit of selected UK national collections to identify artworks by artists of African, Caribbean, Asian and MENA Region descent who were born in, lived, worked or studied in the UK. In 2018, we initiated a ten-vear plan to explore representation in the Collection. This was instigated by our work with BAM and a commitment that year to only collect artworks by women to mark the centenary of the Representation of the People's Act (1918). In recognition that it took a further decade for women to get equitable voting rights, we set ourselves a ten-year target to work towards a full assessment, and subsequent actions, on representation in the Collection in areas of age, disability, sex, race, sexuality, and socio-economic factors. We organised a series of Representation and Interpretation workshops with invited colleagues across DCMS and the sector to gather feedback and information. https://artcollection.culture.gov.uk/explorethe-collection/representation-of-the-peopleproject-2018-28/



Public engagement

2019/2020

In advance of the move to Old Admiralty Building, the Collection curatorial team worked on a public programme that provided opportunities for collaboration with external partners, exploring new ways of bringing knowledge and aspects of the Collection closer to audiences.

Waltham Forest Borough of Culture: *Ways of Seeing*

The collaborative project between the Government Art Collection and Waltham Forest Borough of Culture, *Ways of Seeing* was launched in April 2019 with a press event. This was attended by the then Minister for the Arts, Rt Hon Michael Ellis MP at the Mall shopping centre, where Mel Brimfield's pianola commission (2012) was installed for five weeks with a passing potential audience of 1,100,000

people. The second part of the event at The View, on the edge of Epping Forest (hosting a painting of Epping Forest by Epstein and a Clare Woods forest scene), was attended by funding partner The Art Fund, Cllr Clare Coghill and Deputy Mayor of London for Culture and the Creative Industries, Justine Simons.

At the time of its launch 67 works were on show across 27 locations including schools, libraries, leisure centres, a hospital and a horse riding school. Works by Cornelia Parker and Rachel Whiteread at Vestry House Museum were displayed until the end of September 2019. The works at the museum were seen by over 3,000 visitors, plus 600 more on Art Night.

During May to July, our Public Engagement Curator delivered 26 learning workshops and assemblies to 11 primary and secondary schools and one further education college that

received Collection artworks as part of the Ways of Seeing collaboration. A total of **718** students participated in the workshops; and 22 teachers attended related CPD training. Highlights of the workshops include those co-presented with artist David Leapman at Mission Grove School, Walthamstow, where his painting *Receptacles* was displayed. Public tours were also provided with four guided tours from June to August, exploring Walthamstow, Leyton and Leytonstone and covering eight artworks across seven venues. Participants ranged from ages 18 to 74.

Open House

Curator-led talks were provided for Open House weekend (21-22 September) at the Foreign & Commonwealth Office, Lancaster House and 10 Downing Street.

Due to the impact of COVID-19 and lockdowns since mid-March 2020, the Collection's public engagement work was exclusively digital.

Digital engagement 2019/2020

Our cohesive social media strategy across Twitter, Instagram and Facebook continued highlighting much of the activities mentioned: linking with loans to other exhibitions and promoting out public engagement projects. A new website was developed and launched in 2019 with a new responsive interface and details on the Collection artworks pulled directly from our Collection Management System.

Following specialist recommendation and given the increased public programme activity and audience engagement, we bid for a digital assistant to significantly support digital promotion of Government Art Collection activity. Recommendations included a more strategic approach, using different platforms to present specific content e.g. short filmed clips or 'Stories': and to develop deeper awareness of user demographics/practice.

2020/2021

Shortly after lockdown in mid-March. the Curatorial team delivered at speed #connectedbyart, a new social media campaign and strategy. Posts were published three times a week GOVIABILGUL #connectedbyart on Instagram. Twitter and Facebook, including artworks that supported mental health and wellbeing. provided positivity to audiences at home, linked with external themes (Pride, VE Dav) and supported the arts and museums community. Every Friday we posted under #LetsTalkLoneliness, a tag launched earlier this year by Baroness Barran, Minister for Loneliness, who has supported our campaign. The immediacy of #connectedbyart streamlined our curatorial content during lockdown, allowing us to directly reach audiences. We also joined other campaigns launched by AHRC's Towards a National Collection Programme (e.g. #collectionsunited) and Art UK's #OnlineArtExchange.

VE Week 75th Anniversary digital content

In the week leading up to the 75th anniversary of VE Day on 8 May, the Curatorial and Web teams created new content based on the key themes of peace, reconciliation, new beginnings, celebration and gratitude. A digital presentation of selected artworks and texts linked to each theme was showcased on a new web page. The themes were complemented by social media posts during the week.

ArtSpark – new online learning resources In February we commissioned the artist, writer and educator Claire Collison, to produce content on four selected artworks for ArtSpark, a pilot project to produce free downloadable educational resources. These included resources on King Henry VIII, the portrait by an unknown Anglo-Flemish artist;

ArtSpark was promoted throughout the summer via our social media platforms and as part of the online learning hub of A New Direction.

Voices on Art

A new web feature, Voices on Art was launched, comprising texts written by colleagues from the DCMS BAME Network in response to a work of art from the Collection. Each text was promoted during October on our social media platforms as part of Black History Month. This feature will remain for new texts from other invited staff and external partners, linking in with the wider identities of the Representation of the People Project.

In July, the Government Art Collection featured in The Guardian's The Great British Art Quiz. This was a daily art quiz set by museums, galleries and heritage sites around the UK, which were closed at the time. A collaborative project between The Guardian and Art UK, the Quiz invited new and existing audiences to discover the breadth of collections in an exciting and entertaining way. The Collection also created a special art quiz for DCMS staff, which was promoted across the department in August along with a Spotlight Feature on the Government Art Collection team.

Staff changes

In early June 2019, Anita Dawood, temporary Modern & Contemporary Curator completed her short contract during which she made a valuable contribution to the planning and content development for the new website. Jessica Cerasi, Modern & Contemporary Curator (P/T) took four months' unpaid leave during which she worked with curator Ralph Rugoff on the 2019 Venice Biennale. She left the GAC in March 2020 taking up the role of Assistant Curator for the Guggenheim Abu Dhabi. Dr Claire Fitzgerald, who job-shared her role with Jessica, took on a full-time role to cover the interim period until a new curator was appointed. Jane Fisher, one of the GAC's two Registrars, left in March 2020, to start a new role at the University of Essex. She played an invaluable role in the Collection

programme over the past five years, overseeing art movements worldwide and making many other important contributions to the life of the Collection. Registrar Sarah McFadden, was recruited to cover the move to the Old Admiralty Building. Leigh Anne Manesi began the new post of Digital Engagement Officer in February 2021, having previously worked at the Royal Museums Greenwich. Matthew Lindop provided temporary Technician cover.
